#### Excursion

Excursions were held on the following 4 courses.

#### Course 1: Coastline Course

#### (Sendai City∼Arahama∼Iwanuma∼Yuriage) 129 participants

The main part of the course is Arahama Elementary School. Arahama Elementary School Inside Arahama Elementary School classrooms, the model of the city that spread along the sea in the past was exhibited, and we were surprised at the difference with the view seen from the window of the current classroom.









## Course 2: Tsunami Reality and Reconstruction Course (Minami Sanriku~Okawa Elementary School~Ishinomaki) 124 Participants



The narrator on the tour boat lost her house and family members to the tsunami and life changed dramatically. She talked about the memories of that day and how she felt it in

the area where 20,000 people died.

• And it was impressive that she told Y's Men to live and

cherish every day.

On the return bus, a Y's Man from Kumamoto who was hit by the earthquake said, "We were really grateful for the support from those around us at the time of the earthquake.

The gratitude often wells up in my mind. So, it is good to be able to visit the affected areas of the Great East Japan Earthquake, which is revitalizing for the reconstruction." I was

encouraged with such words.

Course 4: Within 20km of Fukushima Nuclear Power Plant (To learn about Fukushima) 122 Participant's opinions >

• From the perspective of the local residents, I received a detailed and precise explanation of the current situation in Fukushima.

Participants praised the contents of the tour, because they had valuable experience that they would not have understood if they had come here as sightseeing I was very happy

- •It was the first time I visited Fukushima Prefecture after the earthquake.
- •It was a scene I heard in the story, but once again I was struck by a feeling that my heart was tightened, imagining a situation in which my place of life suffered such a disaster that I could not clean up the house or go home.
- Piles of flexible container bags with polluted soil were everywhere, ... a rough grassland that used to be a paddy field. In areas where it is difficult to return home, the roads are blocked and there are also fences at the entrances of the houses. (Omitted.) A warm everyday life was deprived of and it seemed that places were covered with something very cold and inorganic.
